

Manuscript requirements

General information

An electronic copy of the paper should be submitted to jcrl@umk.pl. Please use single line spacing to conserve paper during the review and production processes. As a guide, articles should normally be **between 20000 and 35000 characters** (with spaces) **in length**, with greater length being permitted in exceptional circumstances. The authors should be shown and their details must be printed on a separate cover sheet. A brief **autobiographical note** should be supplied including full name, affiliation and full international contact details (including e-mail address and phone number). In order to ensure the impartiality of the reviewing process, the authors should not be identified anywhere else in the article.

Manuscript structure

The **heading of paragraphs** must be short, clearly defined and numbered. An **introduction** should include: the aim of the paper (and optionally research problems and/or hypotheses), research methodology and the outline of the paper structure.

Authors must supply an **abstract** covering: aim/purpose, methodology/approach, main findings, implications/limitations either for further research, for practice, or for society; and the originality/value of the paper. Maximum is 250 words in total. In addition provide up to six **keywords** which encapsulate the principal topics of the paper.

Figures, charts, plates, tables

All **Figures** (charts, diagrams and line drawings) and **Plates** (photographic images) should be submitted in electronic form. **Figures** should be of clear quality, in black and white and numbered consecutively with arabic numerals.

Figures created in **MS Word, MS PowerPoint, MS Excel** and **Illustrator** (CorelDRAW) should be saved in their native formats. If you are unable to supply graphics in these formats then please ensure they are .tif, .jpeg, or .bmp at a resolution of at least 300dpi and at least 10cm wide.

For photographic images (**plates**) good quality original photographs should be submitted. If supplied electronically they should be saved as .tif or .jpeg files at a resolution of at least 300dpi and at least 10cm wide.

In the text of the paper, the preferred position of all tables, figures and plates should be indicated by typing on a separate line the words "Take in Figure (No.)" or "Take in Table

(No.)". Tables should be typed and included as part of the manuscript. They should not be submitted as graphic elements. Supply succinct and clear captions for all tables, figures and plates.

Citations

References to other publications must be in **Harvard style** and carefully checked for completeness, accuracy and consistency. You should include all author names and initials and give any journal title in full. You should cite publications in the text as follows: using the author's name, e.g. (Adams, 2006, p. 10); citing both names if there are two authors, e.g. (Adams and Brown, 2006, p. 15), or (Adams et al., 2006, p. 20), when there are three or more authors.

Reference list

At the end of the paper a reference list in alphabetical order should be supplied. A reference list should be completed in accordance with the following rules:

Newspaper (year), "Article title", date, page numbers.

Daily News (2008), "Small change", 2 February, p. 7.
